Response to US President Joe Biden's statement about defending Taiwan militarily

For immediate release

Commenting on the statement made earlier today by US President Joe Biden during his visit to Japan that the US would intervene militarily if China were to invade Taiwan, the Chief Executive of the Taiwan Policy Centre, David Spencer said:

"We welcome the firm clarity of President Biden's response to the question on a US response to a possible attack on Taiwan.

"As we noted in our recent report, a policy of strategic ambiguity in regards to the status of Taiwan is increasingly untenable given the current geo-political climate, especially in light of the recent Russian invasion of Ukraine.

"We applaud the US President for his forceful statement and strategic clarity and would urge UK Foreign Secretary Liz Truss and the UK Government to follow their lead and be clear that the UK will help to defend Taiwan in the event of an invasion."
